# Pastor's Message

Dear Friends in Christ,


There is much in society that is winding down: college, local schools, civic organizations. But we here at Christ, Newburgh are still experiencing quite a lot of activity: baptisms, weddings, confirmations, fellowship events, outreach activities, worship and music. My newsletter message each month highlights our activities and intertwines them with Biblical understandings of who we are as the church. This month is no different, but I do want us to consider what we do and why we do it.

At each church council meeting, we begin with Bible study and prayer. At our May meeting, I had us consider the story of Mary and Martha (Luke 10) and how Martha was busy preparing for a meal while Mary sat and listened to Jesus. Understandably, this annoyed Martha, and she asked Jesus why he let Mary sit and be idle while she, Martha, had to do all the work. Jesus replied that Martha was distracted by many things but that Mary had chosen the better option to sit and listen. I then asked the council if this account comforted them or confused them. We engaged in honest discussion, for everyone drew different meaning from the story. One person was comforted by the passage, others truthfully were baffled, while some saw it as not altogether fair, and another learned about balancing faith and work. We've had great church councils in these years I've been here and I thank God for all of you who serve and have served.

I selected the Luke 10 account of Martha and Mary because I want us to consider why we do what we do. Why do we organize fellowship events, participate in activities at the conference, quadrant and synod level, or reach out to the neighbor? Why do we feed the hungry, work on altar guild, sing, or help with the baby pantry or mow the lawn? Because it's not busy work. It's not without substance. What we do gives glory to Christ. Yes there are times we must slow down and listen. But there are times for action too.

Once we find ourselves going through the motions, not sensing mission, then we need to stop and listen to Jesus as Mary did. But when we hear Christ's voice, we are to rise and go, we are to bring hope and the good news to this city of Newburgh.

Summer is seen as a time to rest, and I do want that for you. But every day is a day for mission, prayer, and connection. We as church will also wind down in some ways, but we won't coast through the summer without continuing to connect with one another and serve others. It's who we are. It's our work. It's the glory of Christ.


#### **CALL FOR PHOTOGRAPHS!**

## STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

### Principles of Stewardship - Part 3

The third principle of stewardship is accountability.

A steward is one who manages what belongs to another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities and opportunities given to us by God. One day, each one of us will be asked to account for what we have done with those things.

In review of the parable of the Talents from Matthew 25:14-30, we are told that the master holds his servants accountable for their actions with the Talents they were each given.

"After a long time the master of those servants came and settled accounts with them.

The one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy servant! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? "

This steward made a choice regarding the Talent given to him, which was to do nothing.

We are called as God's stewards to manage that which belongs to God. We are accountable to manage the resources, abilities and opportunities in line with God's purpose. The directions for this are not clear but require prayerful discernment by each of us.

During the coming months of summer, when many people are away, it is possible to overlook what is normally set aside for the Church and mission. Take the opportunity to make your offering in advance if you will be away. The church needs sustaining financial support through this time as much as any other.

# Digital Ministry Update

Working closely with Pastor Mossl, our Digital Ministry outreach continues to engage people near and far. From Americorp Volunteers stationed in Newburgh who found us on Facebook and came to Worship, to a West Coast inquiry about bringing their wedding to Christ Lutheran, Digital Ministry connects. After all, it's how the world connects and communicates in 2016.

In the past month 1,454 different people clicked on Posts on our Facebook page.

Examples: Pastor Mossl's Sermon on Revelation reached 200 people on Facebook and more importantly 15 people clicked to read more on our website.

The Confirmation Facebook Posts on May 22nd reached nearly 1,000 people and 45 clicked on the content. A fun Post about Lutheran Pot Lucks reached over 600.

A few of you may recall a 2014 meeting held at Christ Lutheran with a representative from Rubenstein Associates, a New York City Public Relations firm working for the ELCA Synod. Their guidance to counter declining Church participation had two parts:

**Part one:** Spread the Gospel through activities out in the community, such as Shepherd's Kitchen, and with activities at our Church that welcomed the community in, such as our Spring Concert or the new Baby Pantry.

**Part two:** Rubenstein's Ed Lewi told us to let the community know what we are doing via our website and Social Media. We Spread the Gospel through our Good Works and by communicating those efforts using Social Media.


